# What is the Young Breeders Programme?

The Equine Young Breeders (IRE) programme, initiated in 2005, is facilitated by Teagasc in collaboration with Horse Sport Ireland and funded by Department of Agriculture Food and the Marine (DAFM). A key focus is the assessment of conformation and athleticism traits of performance horses, though the programme delivers much more than that.

The programme has established itself as a mechanism for young people with aspirations to learn more about conformation and athleticism traits which are successful in competition and valued by the marketplace. This is achieved by harnessing the input of experienced breeders, riders and producers while accessing high quality demonstration farms and equines nationally.

The main activities of the programme involve the provision of training days, National Championships and participation at World Championships.

# Is it for you?

Training is open to those aged 14 to 30 years of age, while competitive opportunities are reserved for those aged 16 to 26 years of age.

Participants do not have to be breeders themselves, or even necessarily come from an equestrian background. An avid interest and eagerness to participate and learn is all that is required.



# **Competitions**

Platforms to demonstrate learnings and benchmark against peers at home and abroad are offered through both National and World Championship competitions. These provide an opportunity to test skills and knowledge learned and occur every second year.

National Championships serve as an initial selection for World Championship team participation.

### What is involved?

- Theory (multiple-choice questions on stable management, reproduction husbandry, nutrition, health and welfare, and international sport and breeding rankings.
- 2. Assessment of conformation
- 3. Assessment of athleticism (movement and jumping)
- 4. Presentation of a horse in hand
- 5. Turnout of horses (World Championship team discipline)

# **Championship Successes**

Irish Sport Horse Studbook teams have enjoyed many podium rewards over the years at World Championships within overall studbook rankings, team rankings in the age classes, and across the individual disciplines. The most significant of these were achieved in overall studbook results (the full team, all disciplines) in 2009 when placed third at home in Ireland, in 2013 placed reserve studbook champions in Sweden, and in 2022 when crowned studbook champions in The Netherlands. So many other successes have been enjoyed and celebrated, these are simply the highlights.

# **Industry Collaboration**

The programme's strength lies in the involvement and support of industry leaders including coaches, riders, producers, breeders and others who provide their experience, knowledge and guidance. Through the host farms, participants are exposed to quality performance horses. In so doing they can train their eyes to benchmarks for quality and understand the requirements of the sport, the marketplace, and breeding stock.

# Benefits of the Programme

Training days provide access to high quality coaches, horses, and facilities across the country. Networking among peers and with potential future employers is of considerable benefit in building future career networks and identifying potential career pathways in the equine industry.

The skills and knowledge transferred through training events serves as a foundation for those with an interest in developing their knowledge of the horse, applicable to varying situations. Some examples include in the purchase or sale of equines, deciding on mares and stallions to use for breeding purposes, assessing the products of breeding, presenting equines at inspection, sale, show or competition in hand. As the quantity of horses viewed and discussed over time grows, the more confidence and knowledge builds.





# **Networking and Friendship**

The friendships made can last a lifetime. Having fun while learning is important, and helps build confidence. Many participants travel to training activities on their own, however, everyone has a common interest, the horse, therefore it isn't long before conversations begin and new friendships form. So many participants in the programme over the years have expressed the value they place in the contacts made. Networking with peers both here at home and abroad, for those who are fortunate to compete at World Championship level, is a unique aspect of the programme. Friendships sustain over years. Some become confidants and mentors to each other. Many past participants continue to give back to those who follow in later years by helping out at training or competitive events, a testament also to the enjoyment they experience from doing so.
