

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

Improving the efficiency and profitability of your sheep flock

here are currently 33,766 sheep farmers with a breeding ewe flock of 2.4 million ewes. Sheep farming is the second most popular farm enterprise after cattle production with an annual output value of €186.6 million in 2011. Ireland is 416% self-sufficient in sheepmeat, resulting in over 76% of the total production, valued at €180m, being exported in 2011.

The lowland sheep flock is the major source of lamb output, accounting for more than 85% of carcase output. The hill and mountain flocks account for the remainder.

The short to medium term outlook for world sheepmeat markets and lamb prices is positive, with demand expected to exceed supply over the coming years. This is resulting in a renewed confidence in sheep and there is now an ideal opportunity to improve flock management to capture the potential that this new environment creates to improve returns from sheep farming.

Data from Teagasc eProfit Monitors, National Farm Survey (NFS) and Teagasc BETTER farms all clearly show that well managed sheep production enter-




prises can return gross margins that compare very favourably with other drystock enterprises. These results also show that the number of lambs reared per ewe joined, stocking rate and concentrate feeding to ewes and lambs are key drivers of profitability. There are a number of key components that sheep producers can adopt that will enhance the profitability and, ultimately, the sustainability of their enterprise.

FOCUS ON FACTORS THAT ARE UNDER YOUR CONTROL

Specifically, sheep producers should focus on factors that are under their control and that significantly affect output and profitability, including:

Adopt a three to five-year business plan for your sheep enterprise. Here the focus



should be on drivers of profitability namely increasing:

- **⇒** Amount of grass grown
- **⇒** Stocking rate
- The number of lambs reared per ewe joined
- ⇒ Reducing the amounts of meals fed to ewes and lambs
- ⇒ Improving flock health status

MAXIMISE PRODUCTION FROM GRAZED GRASS.

Grass is the cheapest form of feed and must be central to efficient profitable lamb production. The first objective must be to grow sufficient grass and, secondly, to maintain quality leafy grass in front of the ewes and lambs at all stages. Lowland sheep producers should plan a reseeding programme for their farms.

New, improved grass varieties are overall much more productive and produce more grass earlier in the season.

There is also scope on many farms, particularly on dry farms, to extend the grazing season at both ends of the year, thus reducing conserved feed requirements.

DEVELOP A PLAN TO PRODUCE PROLIFIC FLOCK REPLACEMENTS

Serious lowland sheep producers must develop a strategy of producing prolific flock replacements, preferably from within their own flock or from an outside source. Numerous studies show that the female progeny from Belclare rams have the capacity to wean 1.75 lambs per ewe joined.

CAREFULLY EXAMINE THE AMOUNT OF CONCENTRATE FEEDING TO LAMBS.

There is significant evidence on some farms that an excessive amount of purchased concentrates is fed to both ewes and lambs. Much of this is unnecessary and is doing nothing for profitability except replacing cheaper grazed grass in the diet of the ewes and or lambs. It is necessary to more closely align lambing date with grass supply.

Consider creep grazing lambs ahead of ewes as an alternative to creep feeding of concentrates to lambs. Lamb production systems based on high usage of concentrates become less sustainable when concentrate prices are high or lamb prices are low.

№ RESISTANCE TO ANTHELMINTICS

There is mounting evidence that resistance to anthelmintics is becoming a problem on many farms.

Producers are advised to strategically use these drugs and to ensure the correct dosage is delivered.

Faecal egg sampling of lambs should be used to determine the dosing strategy from weaning, combined with the provision of 'clean pasture' to lambs after weaning. Where there are suspicions regarding the efficacy of a particular drug, this should be investigated through faecal egg counts pre and post dosing and an alternative drug should be used.

₩INTER SHEARING OF EWES

Research at Athenry has shown that shearing ewes at the start of housing in December will increase lamb birth weight by about 0.5kg, and increase weaning weight by about 2kg, resulting in advancing age at slaughter by two weeks. This is a significant and easily attainable productivity gain that could be financially very worthwhile, particularly in an environment of declining lamb prices from June onwards.

LEARN FROM TEAGASC BETTER SHEEP FARMS

Teagasc have established a number of Lowland and Hill BETTER sheep farms to accelerate technology transfer from research to farm practice.

Well-established breeding, grassland, nutrition and flock health technologies are being applied and evaluated on these farms. Discussion groups, organised through the B&T advisers, visit these




farms on a regular basis. Since the start of the BETTER farm programme, the output (*Table 1*) and gross margin on the lowland flocks have significantly improved (*Table 2*).

While sheep prices have improved during the past three years, analysis shows that about 60% of the increase in gross margin came from relatively modest gains in productivity. In the three Hill BETTER farms, significant productivity and financial gains have also been re-

corded from 2009 to 2011 (Tables 3 and 4).

The productivity and financial performance in the Hill BETTER flocks have paralleled the lowland BETTER flocks. Such productivity gains are achievable on most sheep farms by implementing a plan, focused on improving the main drivers of productivity.

If not already a member of a Discussion group, sheep producers are encouraged to join one and learn and adopt technologies from these BETTER farms.

FURTHER INTEGRATION OF HILL AND LOWLAND SECTORS

In some of the mountain and hill areas, producer groups have been established to produce prolific crossbred replacements for fat lamb production on the lowlands. There is scope for further expansion of such initiatives and the certification of the health status of lambs from such groups would further enhance their value and attractiveness to lowland buyers.

MARKETING AND LAMB QUALITY

Lamb should be managed and marketed so as to maintain a high quality standard that merits a premium price in the mar-

Carcaseweight and fat cover are the most important factors in determining carcase quality.

Producers should familiarise themselves with the carcase specifications for the market they supply and select lambs to fit those specifications.

The Bord Bia Lamb Quality Assurance Scheme standard is now a widely recognised standard and membership of this scheme will enable lamb to be sold on the higher priced premium markets.

■ GENETIC IMPROVEMENT

Sheep Ireland is charged with developing a new breeding programmes for sheep and has developed an overall Sheep Value Index.

This is based on the €uro-star system which acts as an indicator of the effect on profitability that can be obtained from the animal's progeny. The €uro-stars are scored on a scale of one to five and compares all animals within each breed. A one star indicates that the animal lies within the bottom 20% of ranked animals for the given trait and a five star corresponds to the top 20% of animals. Sheep Value Index – this is the overall index for each animal and encompasses three sub-indices, each weighted on relative importance:

- ⇒ Production sub-index ranks animals based on their ability to produce good terminal progeny. This takes into account the progeny's growth rate, carcase characteristics and days to slaughter.
- → Maternal sub-index ranks animals on the expected performance of their daughters and takes into account the daughters' mothering ability, ease of lambing and the efficiency at which their progeny are finished.
- ⇒ Lambing sub-index ranks animals for lambing traits and takes into account the lambing ease and survivability of the animal's lambs.

How to use the indices – prior to using any index, each farmer must determine the most suitable animal for their production system. The next question is how to achieve that ideal animal. For example, if farmers are interested in finishing all their lambs for slaughter, then they should pay particular attention to the production sub-index of the animal under consideration. On the other hand, if farmers are looking to breed their own replacements, then they should examine the maternal sub-index carefully. Irrespective of the type of animal that is needed, careful attention should be placed on the star rating of the animal and the accuracy associated with the trait of interest.



All bought-in or returning sheep should be isolated from the rest of the flock and kept in quarantine for at least three weeks to allow for preventative treatments and vaccinations to be administered and regularly inspected for signs of disease.

The higher the accuracy of the given trait, the greater the information that is known about the animal and the greater the confidence producers can have that their published index value reflects their true index value

MAINTAIN A DISEASE FREE FLOCK

The introduction of new sheep on to the farm is the greatest disease threat to an existing flock. Any movement of stock onto the farm, such as sheep being brought back from a sale or show, can pose a threat to the disease status of the flock.

All sheep brought on to the farm are potential disease carriers, even a single well groomed pedigree ram direct from farm or a pedigree sale. Sheep farms are different in terms of management, disease status and the immune status of the flock. A plan needs to be in place for the treatment and management of bought-in sheep to minimise the risk of introducing new diseases to the existing flock. Furthermore, it is also possible to introduce drug-resistant parasites with the transfer of new sheep into a flock.

Potential to improve profit

he number of pedigree ram breeders participating in Sheep Ireland's breed improvement program 'LambPlus' has increased very positively for the 2012 season. This is hugely encouraging and bodes well for breed improvement and the Irish sheep industry as a whole. From a ram buyer's point of view, it illustrates that Irish pedigree breeders are committed to delivering more profitable rams to Irish sheep farmers.

So far, this year has been a disappointing one in terms of lamb price. A very modest growth in breeding ewe numbers surely cannot be at fault for such a change in fortunes for the sector. Producers who continually make efforts to advance their management proficiency are the ones best armed to combat such market volatility. Profitable sheep farmers must attain a wide variety of skills to achieve a high level of productivity from their flocks. The objective of Sheep 2012 will be to demonstrate many of these skills and, undoubtedly, there is something to learn for all involved in the sector.

Half of the genetic make-up of our annual ewe replacements is contributed by the ram we choose to use at breeding. Sheep Ireland's aim is to provide the ram buyer with additional information which they can use to make their final purchasing decision. Every flock contains ewes



that consistently outperform their counterparts under the same farm conditions. Every effort should be made to develop and promote these superior genetics within the flock. These ewes should be mated with high genetic merit rams to maintain a high level of performance. So the question is: where do we find these rams?

Since 2009, Sheep Ireland have been producing €uro-Star genetic evaluations for breeders participating in the performance recording of their sheep. Breeders who participate collect information in relation to lambing and growth performance and maternal ability to help identify rams within each breed that display superior genetic merit. This affords a ram buyer the opportunity to



actively source rams that will contribute in a positive manner to their flock. Sheep Ireland have proven, in the strong commercial projects that are currently in operation as part of the overall breed improvement program, that major differences occur between the performance of physically identical rams across the areas of lambing, growth and maternal qualities. Selection 'by eye' is certainly an essential element of any ram purchase but farmers must ask themselves: how much of any ram's appearance has been determined by his breeding and how much has been determined by the management and feeding of the breeder/ previous owner?

The €uro-Star evaluations provide a hugely valuable extra source of infor-

mation which can be used to identify better genetics within a group of rams. The principal of the €uro-Stars is a very simple one. Within each breed rams are ranked based on all performance records collected for that particular breed. Rams can be selected under specific traits (currently production, maternal & lambing) depending on what aspect of a flock an individual would like to improve. Five star rams for any of the traits represent the top 20% of recorded rams within that breed. Similarly, one star rams represent the bottom 20% of recorded rams, again within that particular breed.

€uro-Star rams are becoming more available to ram buyers as more breeders join the scheme every year. The large volume of commercial flock data that currently feeds into the ram evaluation helps to verify and validate that the evaluations really work in practice. Ram buyers will find €uro-Star rams at all main pedigree sales throughout the coming season in addition to the Sheep Ireland €uro-Star sale planned for August.

COMMERCIAL FARMERS

The level of participation by pedigree breeders will ultimately be determined by commercial sheep farmers. Breed improvement is a medium to long term project which will require commitment from the industry as a whole. The dairy and beef sectors are demonstrating that major gains can be made by using this technology. The opportunity has presented itself to sheep farmers. The only question that now needs to be asked is: have you got figures for that ram?. Those who do not, hopefully soon will, but this will only happen in response to commercial demand.

Satisfying the needs of the consumer

he first quarter of 2012 was a broadly positive one for the Irish sheep sector, with prices continuing to track above previous years. With an exceptionally mild and dry winter, the season got off to a good start, as conditions were ideal for grass growth and outdoor lambing. Trade remained buoyant into mid-April as the Easter period gave an added impetus to consumer demand, both on the domestic and export markets.

Prices took an unexpected downward turn in late April. This was well ahead of the seasonal price adjustment, which normally coincides with the transition from old to new season lamb from late May onwards. According to recent figures released from the Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine, total hogget numbers were up 24% on the previous year, equivalent to an additional 64.000 head.

The additional supplies of heavy hoggets at a time when new season lambs were coming on stream coincided with a weakening demand in France – our main export market. These factors brought about a drop in producer prices, but by mid-June stability returned to the market as prices rose to levels on a par with 2010.

Responding to these circumstances, Bord Bia brought forward and extended the summer lamb promotional campaign. Starting in early June, with an objective of maintaining and increasing the frequency of purchase of Irish lamb



and encouraging shoppers to look for the Bord Bia Quality Mark, a series of promotional activities were put in place to include social media, radio, TV, print, in-store activity and PR.

As one of the most recognised and trusted marks on the Irish retail shelf, the Quality Mark continues to underpin all of our lamb promotional activities on the home market. It continues to be an imperative to grow the membership of



the scheme to ensure that we have a consistent supply of Irish Quality Assured lamb throughout the year. On a positive note, Irish consumers continue to remain loyal to the lamb category. According to a Kantar report commissioned by Bord Bia on the Irish retail market, sales of lamb grew by 16% in the last 12-week period ending 13 May 2012.

Taking into consideration the current economic environment in which consum-

ers are cautious in their spending, we can be re-assured that lamb consumption is growing. Nevertheless, we cannot afford to become complacent; lamb is an expensive meat for the consumer and it is crucial that when they buy it, they really enjoy the eating experience.

That puts an onus on us all within the supply chain to ensure that we deliver and satisfy the needs of the consumer.

The Sheep 2012 marketing seminar, entitled 'Satisfying the needs of the consumer', will deliver some interesting insights into consumers' needs and address the challenges and opportunities ahead for the Irish sheep sector.

Representing all elements of the supply chain, the line-up of presentations, together with a questions and answers session, will generate an excellent debate. 

Wool is back in fashion

he fortunes of wool have changed in the last three years. Rising wool prices has seen shearing transform from a cost to the flock to at least covering its own cost and returning a small margin.

The Wool Village at Sheep 2012 covers all aspects of the production chain from shearing to the final product. Well known shearer George Graham from Wexford will demonstrate shearing techniques, including practices for crutching ewes and lambs to facilitate easier management.

George has also won numerous wool handling competitions and will give advice on handling wool correctly and management practices to improve its processing value.

Shearing conditions have been very difficult to date. Shearing ewes with wet or damp wool will significantly reduce the value of the clip or, even worse, lead to wool heating and rotting when packed. Local wool merchants will have a presence at the event, covering the importance of delivering high quality, dry wool. This also includes advice on presenting, handling and packing wool to maintain it as a high quality natural fibre.

Flockowners will also be able to gain information on wool markets.

A loom supplied and operated by Eddie Doherty, Donegal, will demonstrate the craft of weaving wool. Aine O'Toole and colleagues from The Sheep and Wool Centre, Leenane, are completing a 'sheep to shawl'. This will see an animal sheared in the morning and the fleece brought through numerous traditional spinning and weaving methods to a shawl. Hand-knitters will also demonstrate how various natural homemade Irish woollen garments are made.

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Research at UCD Lyons

yons Research Farm has been synonymous with leading research in sheep nutrition for close on 40 years. The 400-ewe flock, individual animal feeding facilities and state of the art feed analysis laboratories provide an important resource for the national sheep industry.

Recent work has examined the effect of late pregnancy energy and protein nutrition on the subsequent performance of the lamb to slaughter. This work highlights the importance of nutrition during late pregnancy to set the ewe up for lactation. How we feed the ewe in the last six weeks of pregnancy can have a major influence on the performance of her lambs up to weaning. Dietary approaches which appear to give similar performance at lambing time can have dramatically different effects on the performance of the lamb up to weaning.

As the emphasis in Irish agriculture continues to shift towards maximising the utilisation of grass, the intake capacity and requirements of the suckling ewe and her lambs is becoming more important. We need to fully understand how much grass a ewe requires to support lactation and what level of performance is achievable from grass alone. A new research programme will begin on this topic later this year.

The major focus of our research work in the last 10 years has looked at the effect of mineral nutrition of the pregnant ewe on the disease resistance of her lambs. When the lamb is born it has



practically zero disease resistance and is dependent on absorbing antibodies from the mothers' colostrum to obtain disease resistance in early life. Our work has clearly demonstrated that excessive iodine intake in late pregnancy (something which frequently occurs) will result in the lamb being unable to obtain immunity from its mother's colostrum and, as a result, is more susceptible to disease.

This is a very specific response and the excess iodine intake must occur during the final two weeks of pregnancy. During this time the lamb is pre-programmed to be unable to absorb the antibodies, through an alteration in the expression of certain genes located in the small intestine which are responsible for transporting these antibodies into the lambs' bloodstream.

What to do with triplet lambs is a recurring question on many farms? We have examined the potential to finish



triplet lambs through early weaning approaches. Triplet lambs reared using an early weaning system have achieved growth rates in excess of 300g/day from birth to slaughter. This demonstrates the great potential for growth that the triplet lamb processes and highlights the potential this lamb has to contribute to output in a prolific flock. The challenge is to maximise this potential in commercial practice.

In 2009, UCD began a sheep breeding programme in collaboration with Sheep Ireland. This partnership resulted in establishing the Central Progeny Test (CPT) Centre at UCD Lyons Estate. The CPT Centre consists of a ram semen collection and test facility and the Lyons sheep flock entering the CPT programme that routinely records pedigree, DNA

and phenotypic information. Since then, approximately 35 rams with good genetic linkage, representing six breeds (Belclare, Charollais, Suffolk, Texel, Vendeen, and Rouge de l'Ouest), have entered the semen collection and test centre at UCD Lyons.

The rams are trained for artificial semen collection and the semen is analysed for sperm motility, sperm count, linear motion and semen concentration as part of the semen quality assessment. Only rams with high quality semen are used for laparoscopic artificial. These rams are transported to four flocks in the CPT programme where over 2,000 ewes are inseminated with fresh semen.

The UCD flock is currently taking part in Sheep Ireland's CPT programme. In October the oestrous cycle of 400 ewes is synchronised. The ewes are then artificially inseminated using Laparoscopic AI. These ewes lambed in March. Within 12 hours of birth, all lambs are double tagged with a DNA tag and an EID NSIS tag. Information collected at lambing included date of birth, litter size, gender, lambing difficulty and birth weight.

This information is collected using a hand-held scanner and the data uploaded immediately to the Sheep Ireland database in Bandon, Co Cork, where it is used in the national genetic evaluations.

As part of the CPT programme, 40-day weights, weaning weights and slaughter weights are recorded.

Ultrasound measurements of fat and muscle are also recorded to estimate carcase quality. The health trait of faecal egg counts is also recorded to help estimate the parasite load.

The over-arching objective of all sheep breeding research at UCD Lyons is to improve profitability for Irish sheep enterprises.

Veterinary Laboratory Service

Achieving the highest possible standards of animal health and welfare

he Veterinary Laboratory Service of the Department of Agriculture comprises the Central Veterinary Research Laboratory at Backweston and six Regional Veterinary Laboratories (RVLs) in Athlone, Backweston, Cork, Kilkenny, Limerick and Sligo.

Its mission is to co-operate with veterinary practitioners and farmers in achieving the highest possible standards of animal health and welfare in Ireland by providing technical and logistical support to the State veterinary service for its regulatory role in animal disease.

It also offers a laboratory diagnostic, investigative and consultancy service to the livestock industry through veterinary practitioners.

An important aspect of the service is its role in monitoring and collating information on diseases at a national level and identifying the presence of new and re-emerging diseases which may have implications for animal and public health and maintenance of the country's high animal health status. The RVLs provide a multi-disciplinary diagnostic service to support the clinical work of the veterinary practitioners.

They can also call on the expertise of their colleagues in the Bacteriology, Parasitology, Pathology and Virology Sections at the Central Veterinary Laboratory for any skills that may be necessary for surveillance testing, disease monitoring and investigation of animal health problems of infectious or environmental aetiology.
