farming operations	 Of commercial suckler herd, 40% calved in Autumn, 60% in Spring time.
	 Calving period is mid Sept to 1st Dec and 1st week Feb to 20th April.

Details	Pedigree & Commercial suckler herd. Milk being maintained by using Limousin bulls that are 5 star for maternal.
	Stocking Rate:
	Skidoo 1.9LU/ha and home farm 2.0LU/ha.
	Grass:
	Silage cut mid May and should be in the mid 70's for DMD. Uses block grazing within the paddocks.
	Discussion Group:
	In discussion groups prior to BTAP, Grange Grass Group (Ned Heffernan –Teagasc Adviser) and Positive Farmers Group in Meath (Aidan Fleming – Teagasc Adviser).
Lessons	Things I got right along the way:
	 Grass – Paddock grazing and quality of silage.
	 Efficiency – Not on home farm during the day so labour efficiency important.
	 Breed of animal – right cow type, aiming for a calf per cow per year. Must have a functional cow that works.
