The Teagasc 'Garden of Hope' aims to:

- ∞ provide a peaceful space for spiritual renewal, reflection and ease
- encourage contemplation and walking to relieve stress in a calm and secure environment
- create an uplifting space in which to pause and replenish one's well-being through a fusion of planting, sophisticated colours and changing water flow
- ∞ evoke serenity and a connection with nature to raise the spirit.

The positive contribution of Pieta House is recognised universally and is celebrated through the creation of this garden. Darkness into Light, which is the charity's flagship awareness event, is represented through the colour scheme of the planting. Following Bloom, a modified design of the garden will move to a permanent home at one of the Pieta House centres.
