



WHERE THEY CANNOT SEE – IS WHERE YOU SHOULDN'T BE!


NEVER stand near a tractor or any machinery when they're in use! Visibility can be limited for farmers when sitting high up in tractors, combine harvesters, etc and they will not see you if you approach. Also the noise they create means they cannot hear you. **Look at the pictures and note where the tractor blind spots are located, then colour in the blind spots on the tractor drawings below.**











FARMER WELLBEING

As with all times of the year, farmers must remember their wellbeing as well as staying safe.

Harvest time is a busy time so here are some key tips to keep farmers (and everyone) safe and well.

Remind farmers of the following:



Drink water: Stay hydrated when spending a long time in tractors, especially on warmer days.

Skin: Cover Up using wide brimmed hats and long sleeved shirts. Protect their skin from the sun's rays with high sun protection factor, (SPF) cream.

Hat & wraparound sunglasses: Protects head and eyes from the sun

Phone & Communication: Keep their phone charged and always let people know where they will be.

Take breaks: Working when tired leads to accident and injury.

Masks: Use a P2 dust mask when working with hay/in dusty conditions.
