NOTICE TO OWNERS AND OCCUPIERS

ROADS ACT 1993

Take notice that under the terms of the Roads Act 1993, landowners and occupiers of land are obliged to take all reasonable care to ensure that the trees, ditche redges and other vegetation growing on their land are not or could not become a danger to people using or

Liability for damage or injury resulting from such hazards will rest with the landowner/occupier.

examples of hazards might be dead or dying trees, ditches or hedges interfering with traffic, blocking notpaths, obscuring road signs or obscuring a view

You are required to fell, cut, log, trim and remove such trees, ditches and hedges.

Adequate signposting should be provided and the Council and Gardai notified before works commence

Section 40 of the Wildlife Acts 1976 and 2000 prohibits the cutting, grubbing, burning etc. of any vegetation on uncultivated land between 1st March and 31st August,

Fed the heifers seaweed and ration. Fed the cows silage.

Cleaned out the hen house. We got 5 eggs. We put in fresh straw and water and checked their food.

Cleaned out the shed for calving. We put the old straw on the tractor and brought it to the field .

We learned that cows have 4 stomachs. When cows burb and fart they release gas. This gas is bad for the environment.

There is a Research place in Fermoy where the cows wear backpacks. Scientists are watching their gas output.

From the 12th of January farmers in Cork can spread slurry. It is later in Limerick and Donegal.
